Introduction

The government gives money to schools (called the *PE and Sport Premium*) to improve sport and PE, so that young people have the opportunity to live healthy and active lives. A positive experience of sport and physical activity at a young age can build a lifetime habit of participation.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of their physical education (PE), physical activity and sport.

Schools must produce a report each year to explain how they have spent the funding. This is that report!

This means that schools should use the PE and Sport Premium to:

- develop or add to the PE, physical activity and sport that the school provides
- build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Five key indicators

Schools should use the premium to secure improvements in the following five key indicators:

1. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity
2. Profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

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Key indicator one: Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity
